

University pilots Synchronized Dance Sports by Janine Kae D.

Different from the traditional Dance Sports competition, USL adapted the Synchronized Dance Sports this year as it celebrates its fiftieth anniversary, branding it as the very first institution to do so in the Region of Cagayan Vallev.

The modification in the Dance Sports competition entails two pairs moving in unison in one dance. It requires two pairs from each department for each category, the Standard and Latin, who will dance the same routine in harmony as every step, lock, turn and slide should be identical.

On its first show on Feb. 11, 2015 at the jam-packed Ter Meer Gymnasium, the Pasodoble and Samba for Latin category and the Waltz for the Standard category were danced across the stage one department at a time.

The other dance competitions under the Synchronized Dance Sports will be on the second and third shows on February 13 and 14 at the same venue.

So much is at stake in the two categories, for each dance is counted as one event in the pointing system. Latin with five dances is 50 golds and Standard with four is 40 golds.

MAJOR EVENTS NO MORE

A lways before, competitions during USL foundation days were segregated as major and minor events. Not anymore.

This year, a new pointing system has been launched by the Supreme Student Council wiping away the concept of major and minor events. Compared to the previous system that allots higher percentage to major events which were usually Cheer and Dance, Debate and Basketball, the new system designates equal points at stake to each event.

The at least 35 participants in the Jump Street as well as the lone participant in Essay Writing are all fighting for ten golds, the points given to the first place winners for every event. Two special cases are the Standard and Latin Category of the Synchronized Dance Sports. Fifty golds are at stake in Latin Category, ten golds for each dance namely, Cha Cha, Rumba, Paso Doble, Samba and Jive.

The new system requires equal attention and preparation to every event. The individual categories will not be set aside because the gold points they will be earning are of the same number with the categories requiring many participants. However, pressure is greater for the individual



participants, for the gravity of their effort will be counted as the same as that of 35 or 50 other participants in one event.

Although the new system measures the true winner for it seeks to give credit to the department which is best in Socio-Cultural, Literary and Sports events combined, still, the new system cannot wipe out the notion that every department should give most attention to the big Socio-Cultural events such as Jump Street, Cheer and Dance, and Street Dance and big Visual events such as the Eco-show which undoubtedly receive the most allotment of budget from the department and anticipation from the audience.

Is there really equality now that there no more major or minor events? The answer differs from every department, based on which events the department does excel and on what equal means to them.

The winners of the said session and showdown will be announced on the last day of the celebration, Feb. 15, 2015.




